From the President, Brad Greeley



It was probably the summer after my first year of Junior High (back in 1950 when our schools were named that way). My family and I were packed into a couple of rooms on the northwest corner of Oceanic, first floor, for our conference: All Star (no number then). I had graduated from the grades to the youth group, albeit the junior one. The memory I hold from that week was what followed the exercise event. I loved Capture the Flag and the other things we did. But the quiet activity was new. Our leaders (can't remember their names, sadly) would describe a dramatic scene. And we had to figure out the "solution" and the why.

The situation that sticks in my mind almost 60 years later is the one where the school bus is careening down the narrow mountain road with a steep drop off on one side and solid rock on the other. The brakes have failed. The bus has the youth group in it. As it comes around the bend immediately in front of the bus are a mother and three young children walking down the mountain. The width of the bus and road are very similar but even if they all went to one side, which side? There is no time for signals and such planned moves. If they all lay down very quickly the bus probably would ride right over them. But they're much to frightened to imagine that. So the driver of the bus (we each got to be in that role) has to decide whether to drive off the side of

the road to save the family -- and kill all in the bus, probably. Or NOT: to drive straight ahead and surely kill all those in the way.

We spent a long time trying to think of ways to escape the dilemma (the advisors were quick to disallow those attempts). And then, trying to construct moral arguments for one of the forced choices.

The Island makes all kinds of lasting impressions on us. And they are not all of the funky water system, or personal connections, or the natural beauties and wonders kind. The wrestling with moral and philosophical issues which was ignited by my youth group experiences on Star had a great deal to do with where I choose to spend my professional life. I'm sorry I can't thank those youth advisors who got me puzzling over life with those moral conundrums. But I'm sure glad they did.

Life does have a way of forcing choices on us. Fortunately few are of the magnitude of the brakeless bus. But we regularly encounter ones that are hard to reconcile. The change in the economy has forced upon all of us choices we didn't expect to have to make. I hope all of you are managing to choose to come to Star for a week this summer even though it may be more challenging to do than in earlier years. We need you -- and perhaps this is the year one of your children, or yourself, will have an important transformative experience.

As you know, we have been forced to review our conference schedule in a way we never imaged we would. The Board has decided to keep the original calendar

in place through 2010. Before conferences begin this summer we will let everyone know the schedule for 2011 and beyond.

You also know that Cornell extended an offer to purchase the part of Appledore that the SIC owns. After conversations with them during which we offered to finance such a sale if we agreed to sell, they withdrew their offer. They are now asking us to help them rebuild their sewage system and give them more time to decide if they want to stay on Appledore. These are very hard choices and we continue to talk with them about answers. We will keep you informed.

The conclusion of our Annual Fund in 2008 was short of our goal for the year by more than \$100,000. Tough choices had to follow. The Staff and Finance Committee did yeomen's work redrawing the budget and the Board approved the revised draft at the January Board meeting. More than ever, we urge you to come to the Island this summer, invite your friends to come, as well, and give a generous gift to our Annual Fund. They are choices that have to do with the life of our beloved Island.

Nor did we have any choice about moving from our old office. They said go. We went. And, thanks to sharp work on the part of our Staff, we have a wonderful new home just up the street in Portsmouth. We're up and running there and ready to bring you the best summer ever on Star Island. Come by the Office and say hello. And then "Sail out, sail out, to Gosport Harbor and lose yourself in dreams."

Introducing Our New Development Director, Angela Matthews

Justina Maji, Development Associate, asked Angela some questions to help us all learn a little about Angela and how she is thinking about Star Island. Here are her responses to Justina's questions.

What was your first impression of Star Island Corporation when you came to interview in October?

My first impression came long before October. For four or five years in the 1990s I was on Star Island for the IRAS conference as part of the childcare team. My friend Sandra Woodworth recruited me because our sons were best friends. Chris got to go along with Asher to play and I got to go along with Sandra to work. It was extraordinary. The time on the island was always rejuvenating and the friendships with conferees and caregivers developed over the years into a lovely circle. Chapel services are always a special experience on Star and the service our children's group offered consistently got rave reviews.

Walking in the door to the corporate offices in October just confirmed everything I had already experienced about Star. This is an amazing place to work and my co-workers are a dedicated and intelligent group of men and women who will provide inspiration for the hard work ahead of us.

Isn't this a sort of coming home for you?

Ironically, this month (January) I am reversing the commute I started 8 years ago when I left Portsmouth for a position with Plymouth State University. I was with New Hampshire Charitable Foundation for all of the 1990s first as a program officer then later as executive director. Before that I was the executive director of Community Child Care Center now located out at the Portsmouth Community Campus, and before that I taught at Lafayette and Little Harbor schools. It's great to be back in the city I called home for almost 30 years.

What do your children think?

I have two children –adults now – and they are very happy. Tracy actually worked one summer for Sandra during IRAS and Chris spent many summers on Star. Tracy graduated from Portsmouth High School and Chris was a sophomore when we moved north. They love Portsmouth and will enjoy coming back to visit me once I'm settled here. But first I have to sell my house so I'm commuting for now so they still get to see a lot of me.

The Seacoast division of New Hampshire Charitable Foundation recently awarded a grant to SIC for community outreach. You mention that you worked for the division. What were some of your memorable projects?

NHCF and the Seacoast Division are amazing organizations. So much great work flows through them including this outreach grant to SIC. Their belief in SIC is an important endorsement for us with

other funders. We – and by we I mean donors, volunteers, staff, and non-profit organizations in the region – did so many things when I was there. To name a few, I am most proud of the lasting impacts of the Diversity Project that gave Portsmouth the Black Heritage Trail, the Affirming Seacoast Partnership to make the Seacoast a safer place for LGBT and Questioning adults to live, a Lila Wallace Readers Foundation grant for Arts Build Community that evolved into the City's Cultural Commission Arts-Speak, the Papoutsy Seminar for Women Entrepreneurs that resulted in the creation of the Women's Business Center (WBC), and the Collaboration of Community Foundations for the Gulf of Maine that received considerable support from national foundations to assist in the protection of the Gulf marine environment.

Wow, that is a lot of action!

I know. There were many people and organizations involved in those initiatives and it was a lot of fun.

What do you think about the plans for Star Island Corporation and the possibilities from your perspective as a fundraiser?

This is a very exciting time to be involved with SIC. I've been so impressed with the few volunteers I've met so far and everything I've been learning about the Annual Fund. You and Brian Winters and especially Irene Bush have done an amazing job this past year or so building a very strong annual fund and gaining support for Star. The grant SIC just received from the Piscataqua Region of NHCF allows us to hire Priscilla Hodgkins as a half-time Outreach Coordinator. She organized the highly successful Seacoast Day last year and will repeat that this year along with implementing other strategies of the SIC marketing plan. Seacoast Day on Star Island

The second annual Seacoast Day on Saturday, June 6 will bring 200 guests to Star Island for a day of tours, exhibits, workshops, lunch, and meetings with conference representatives. After their day on Star Island we know many will be making plans to come back for a conference, a weekend, or a day trip, just as those who attended last year's Seacoast Day did.

Last June 149 people from local and state government, funding agencies, local businesses, newspapers, our vendors, and members of the Portsmouth Chamber of Commerce attended Seacoast Day and enjoyed a lunch provided by The Wentworth By-the-Sea. We were surprised to



learn that over 80% of the guests had not been to Star Island but not surprised to see that many of the people who came to Star last summer for a personal retreat heard about this option on Seacoast Day.

Invitations will soon go out to our neighbors in the seacoast area in business, government, the arts, and funding. Once again we expect to introduce Star Island to many people who have only heard about the Isles of Shoals or seen the islands floating on the eastern horizon. On June 6 they will enjoy a delicious lunch on the piazza provided by a local restaurant, learn about the town of Gosport, meet a few Star Island Pelicans, and get a glimpse of what it would be like to spend more than a few hours on this special island. Activities for this year's guests will include docent-led tours of the island, talks about the island's history, and possibly hands-on workshops in digital photography, sketching,


In each of these areas of operation – volunteers, donors, staff – Star Island is blessed with a solid foundation. Cam-

From the CEO, Vicky Hardy



Wanted: CEO for New England non-profit; position involves working on an island, with thousands of intense and passionate people, in centuries-old buildings with multiple challenges...the faint of heart need not apply!

It was just over one year ago that I received a phone call from Brad Greeley who, on behalf of the Board of Directors, invited me to serve as the CEO of the Star Island Corporation. This offer came after an intensive process involving multiple interviews, reference and background checking, and long conversations with the Search Committee.

Over the holidays, I had the opportunity while snowbound with my family in Seattle, to reflect on the past year, and my experiences...and thought I might share some of those thoughts with you.

First and foremost, the one qualification for the position that was not listed and reviewed...the ability to survive rough seas in a small boat and not get sick! Hav-

ing been thoroughly tossed about in the Privateer, and rocked and rolled in the PJ waiting off the float for the Uncle Oscar to leave, I can verify that I apparently do have "sea legs".

Second, this is a very large community of interested people; I was aware when I accepted the position that we had a Board of Directors, a separate board for the Trustees of the Permanent Trust, and more than 300 members of the Corporation. What I did not appreciate was that the mailing list of almost 8,000 households represented another very large contingent of people with ideas, opinions, and a healthy investment in the future of the Island.

To paraphrase Martha Stewart, "this is a very good thing!" We need all the helping hands and hearts we can find to survive and grow in this economy, in this century, and in this moment. For example, 37 people under the skilled guidance of Dave and Patty Boynton, transformed our quite shabby new offices into a beautiful

home for our Portsmouth base. Without all those hands and hearts, I would be sitting in very dingy room, painted institutional green (you know the color!), with a filthy 1970s carpet. Their magic has made coming to work every day a real pleasure...and Dave managed to cut the supplies budget/bill in half!

So I will leave you with the words of John Wilkins, President of Wilkins Investment who has managed the Permanent Trust through very rocky waters: "Investors have greater optimism as 2009 begins than they did one year ago." I too have greater optimism; we completed a successful full season in 2008, we have found some terrific people for our staff team, we have already received our first \$1,000 gift for the 2009 Annual Fund, and registrations have begun. You will come back, and I am proud to be standing at the top of the ramp to welcome you home for 2009.

From the Development Office



It feels good to begin this Development Office update with the thought that – in fact – I am a Shoaler. For several years from 1997 to the early 2000s I was recruited by my friend Sandra Woodworth to be a childcare-giver for the IRAS conference. Among the many benefits was the opportunity to attend some unforgettable lectures and to meet and talk with so many interesting people including some very cool children.

I vividly recall that first summer on Star when it seemed I'd stepped onto the set of a very long running play where everyone knew the lines and the next scene. Warnings not to stand too close to the porch bell around meal times or lifting the nest of cups onto the table to watch them spin into place or standing in line to get a lantern for the candle-lit processions to evening chapel all became a comfortable and familiar part of my own experience. This is indeed a special place and it is good that it has endured unchanged for almost a century in a time when almost nothing stays the same for a minute. It's the rudder that rights us as soon as we step foot off the boat – we have come back!

In large measure, it is your volunteer support that makes Star Island possible. So many of you start and end the season as volunteers for Island Open and Island Close and then come in between for Island rest! We are grateful for this

commitment of time and talent that saves enormous expense to the Corporation. The names of all the 2008 volunteers appear at the end of this annual donor list. There will be a more detailed report in the 2009 year-end newsletter of the 37 volunteers who helped to paint and ready our new home at Morton-Benedict House. Dave and Patty Boynton managed the volunteers and the materials and in less than a month – and under budget! – transformed the drab space into sparkling new offices. They deserve our recognition now for the countless hours they spent on the fussy task of preparing the space so that others could apply the broad brush strokes. Thank you, Dave and Patty.

Last fall the Development Office posted an in-depth survey at the Survey Monkey web site. There were 215 who completed the online survey on every subject from personal connection to leadership to fundraising. The results are very interesting and will help us to shape the coming capital campaign. There were many good ideas and excellent input to the questions on fundraising, particularly in relation to responding to gifts. We learned that:

- Timely and accurate gift acknowledgement was cited repeatedly as highly important to donors.
- Many respondents also wanted to know the impact of gifts through stories and

postings at the web site.

- You told us that recognition is important but it must be cost effective.
- Just about half of survey respondents like the new listing by giving circles while the other half of respondents prefer a single alphabetical list.
- Some respondents thought that loyal donors who give year after year deserve special recognition on lists and one respondent suggested loyal donor pins or decals.

Mostly, the survey told us Star Island donors want to feel valued. Your gifts help us to achieve excellence in all that we do, and to provide the highest level of service to all who call Star Island home.

In 2008 your gifts to Star totalled \$544,263. We are grateful for your support and recognize your generosity on the following Donor Recognition List. We will do all that we can in the coming year to assure you that your gifts are appreciated and critical to the success of our mission. Yes, thank you and thank you again. Your support allows us all to keep coming home.

Prudence Crandall Randall known to many Shoalers as "Prudie," died November 6, 2008, at the age of 90. Born in Ayer, she was the daughter of the late Rev. Frank B. Crandall and Doris F. Crandall. She was raised and educated in Ayer and was a graduate of Lasell College in Newton. Prudie owned Lunging Island and the Honeymoon Cottage which she offered to many Shoalers who had just married. She had a long history with Star. There is a photo of her as a child sitting on Uncle Oscar's lap. She had been a Pelican and often visited in Vaughn Cottage to read old Pel Papers from her era. She was an accomplished poet who often gained inspiration from her beloved Isles

of Shoals, where she spent her summers on Lunging Island with friends and family. A book of her poetry is available in the Star Island Bookstore. A lover of jigsaw puzzles, Mrs. Randall in her lifetime assembled more than 1,000 Springbox puzzles. The television production crew for the Sci-Fi Channel's series *Ghost Hunters* came to Star Island in November to film an episode about its spectral visitors. The producers, directors and on-camera investigators from The Atlantic Paranormal Society (TAPS) spent a week in Portsmouth preparing for their night in on Star Island. Their work began with historical research at the Portsmouth Athenaeum and included interviews with local historians and ended with a dark and stormy night spent on Star Island.
