Subject: Swimming Pool

We cordially solicit considered reactions to the proposition that we should build a "swimming pool" on Star Island. Don't think of tile and chromium; but do think of an artificial, salt-water, sanitary pool, with enough "prepared" space around it so that it affords opportunity for pool-side visiting, for swimming in water 5 to 10 degrees warmer than the ocean, but probably not for diving in the formal sense.

Where? Maybe between the flagpole and the water. Maybe using one of the "ice-ponds" at the east end of the island. (It does not seem feasible to dam off a part of the ocean because of the potential damaging effect of winter storms.)

Assume that the capital costs are contributed for that exclusive purpose and that the annual maintenance costs would be within reason, would you want it?

Assume that it competes for money which might otherwise be used for new living units, for more tennis utilities, for a new natural science and marine biology facility, or for something else that you think is desirable, how would you rank the priorities?

This will not be decided by popular vote, but we seriously seek your comments, written below or orally submitted to any member of the Corporation Board, to Theo Nash, or to Farry Lent or the McGills.
