
Bread & Puppet


LCHIP Grant Awarded—\$125,000

SEA Star: Educating Students About the Isles of Shoals

n 2017, Star Island launched a crosscurricular educational pilot program for visiting elementary and middle school students. Covering Social Studies, Environmentalism, and the Arts (SEA), the SEA Star program offers single day or overnight lessons for visiting students. Focused on the rich history of the Isles of Shoals, marine science and sustainability, visual art, and poetry, schools across New Hampshire and Massachusetts participated in the programming. Here are some examples of the activities that take place on island.

- HUNT FOR HISTORY Vaughn
 Cottage Library & Museum staff lead
 students on an interactive, historical
 island tour, sharing what the island
 looked like in the past compared to
 the present.
- PEERING INTO PLANKTON –
 Students fish for plankton off the
 Star Island dock and examine the
 specimens under microscopes in the
 Rutledge Marine Lab with our Island
 Naturalists.
- WASTE RACE A relay race designed by Star Island's Environmental Services team, teaches students about

the differences between landfill, recycling, and compost and how to help the environment by sorting waste into the correct receptacles.

- ISLAND RHYMES Former
 Portsmouth Poet Laureate Kate Leigh
 guides students through writing their
 own Celia Thaxter inspired poetry
 about what they see, hear, and feel on
 Star Island.
- TEACUP TECHNIQUES Star Island's Art Director showed students how to use different artistic techniques to design their own teacup, inspired by Celia Thaxter's original hand-painted pottery displayed in the Vaughn Cottage Museum Collection.
- STAR SERVICE This program provides an opportunity for students to give back to Star Island and learn about the teamwork and creativity it takes to run an island. Students helped maintain or harvest the gardens or helped fold linens and observe the island laundry process. Star Service is also available for recreational groups and high school students.

Denise Buckman, a fourth grade teacher from Grantham Village School who participated in the on island program shared, "We were fortunate to visit Star Island on a beautiful early summer day. A favorite experience of our students was a relay activity involving recycling led by an enthusiastic group of college kids. The staff at Star share a love and respect for the natural environment and are passionate about stewardship. It was a pleasure to experience Star Island and learn more about this gem just off NH's coast." Star Island is thrilled to continue the SEA Star program this spring and fall. This year we will be collaborating with Historic New England's Sarah Orne Jewett House Museum and Visitor Center of South Berwick. Thanks to this partnership, SEA Star's social studies activity will provide a narrative on the Maine writer's friendship with Shoals artist Celia Thaxter, connecting island and mainland history!



Creating the Future of Wastewater

lans for the new wastewater treatment/reclamation system on Star Island are moving forward and our groundbreaking project should be operational next year! Financing approval for the project was assured last July with the signing of formal documents for a low-interest loan from the State of New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (DES) under the EPA's Clean Water State Revolving Fund. This program has until recently provided money only to municipalities for wastewater improvements. Recent changes in the program guidelines have opened the program to non-profit organizations. Star Island was the first non-profit in the state to qualify for a wastewater loan, which has a low fixed interest rate and a term of twenty years.

In addition to finding a reliable system that can address our seasonal occupancy fluctuation and effectively manage the high nutrient content of the island waste stream, engineers were also asked to recommend an approach which reduces electricity demand, and can allow recycling of treated wastewater for uses such as toilet flushing and irrigation.

In February we received the final report from Underwood Engineers including specific recommendations for a new system and other improvements to the waste stream process. The report followed extensive meetings with regulators over the past eighteen months, and represents a truly collaborative approach to meeting a broad range of goals for an improved system.


The first recommendation in the Underwood Report is to install an expanded grease trap system that can remove more waste materials from the kitchen flow before they hit the treatment plant. This system will be installed this spring. A series of large plastic chambers will contain the wastewater from the kitchen, slowing it down long enough to cool. This allows suspended fats, oils and grease to be captured for later disposal before it reaches the waste treatment plant. Such removal is essential to efficient and reliable operation of any system.

The report goes on to evaluate ten different treatment system options on the basis of cost, feasibility, visual impact, ease of operation, quality of treated effluent, energy consumption and other factors.

Underwood recommends a system called Amphidrome, in technical terms a "submerged attached growth biologically active filter (BAF)." These systems are manufactured in New England and have been successfully deployed in hospitals, resorts, schools, office parks and similar developments with large wastewater demands not serviced by public sewers. The system, which fits entirely within the existing waste treatment tanks, relies on bacteria and filtration to process up to 17,000 gallons of island wastewater per day, using only 10% of the energy of our current system.

The final product, after disinfection similar to that used in our drinking water system, is expected to be non-potable re-use. No longer simply wastewater for ocean discharge, this reclaimed resource will ultimately be used to flush island toilets and for lawn irrigation. Star Island is working with DES to help write the rules for the use of recycled wastewater in what is recognized as an important pilot project in New Hampshire that will have statewide benefits for waste treatment and water conservation efforts.

Final approvals are expected in mid summer 2018, allowing construction to begin shortly thereafter. If all goes as planned, the new system will be in operation for the 2019 season.



osport Remembered, the Last Village at the Isles of Shoals, tells the story of the last years of the little village that existed on Star for many years before the island became a conference center. First published twenty years ago by the Portsmouth Marine Society, a special 20th anniversary paperback edition has been reprinted and copies will be available at the Star Bookstore.

Many years before Star Island was a conference center, it was home to a small village called Gosport. From 1623 until 1872, Star supported fishermen and their families. In the early years when cod were huge and abundant and few settlements were on the mainland, the island's fishermen were some of the wealthiest people in New England. They dried cod for export to Europe, but as seacoast towns grew and fear of Native American attacks diminished, the more successful families moved to the mainland.

Gosport became an incorporated town in the state of New Hampshire, electing officers and even a member of the legislature. But life on the island was difficult. Imagine having enough drinking water, or fuel for heating and cooking. Dried fish were sold or bartered, but money was in short supply. Ministers were often paid with dried fish they had to sell for income.

At the time of the American



Revolution, the villagers were asked to leave the island since their loyalty to the cause was somewhat in doubt. After the war ended those who returned were probably people who had trouble getting established on the mainland and others who just missed the freedom of living on an island.

The quality of life declined and, by 1800, missionaries were assigned to Star to support the few remaining families. It was during the nineteenth century when summers visitors began to arrive, hosted by small inns on Smuttynose and, later, Star, and in 1848 the large Appledore House on Appledore Island. Many visitors

such as authors Nathaniel Hawthorne and Charles Henry Dana, wrote about the islands and its people.

When a large collection of 1860s photographs of primarily Star became available, Peter Randall and Maryellen Burke decided to put together a book of the pictures and the contemporary works of visitors as well as Celia Thaxter and her brothers.

It is remarkable that so much was written about this little village that no longer exists. This rich literary output forms the heart of the book and brings to life the scenes and the people who were photographed.


Star Island Countdown Chain




Summer will be here before you know it!

WHAT'S ON DECK





We are constantly working on improvements, repairs and maintenance of our beloved island. Are you curious about what's on deck for the next few years? Here are some of our major projects for 2018 and beyond.

Shack Renovation

We are excited to begin work on the Shack renovation this spring. As the primary housing for Pelicans, Shack is one of the older buildings on island—built the same year as the Oceanic Hotel in 1876. Shack was previously renovated 30 years ago, with an additional interior renovation 15 years ago, but it is now in need of a complete overhaul. Spring renovations will include rehabbing of the entire exterior, window replacements, bathroom upgrades, and an extension of Shack Deck. As the central gathering place for Pelicans and a staple landmark in our island community, we want to make sure Shack is around for decades to come! Oceanic Tower and West Wall Restoration

Thanks to our friends at the Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP) and generous individual donors, we are able to begin framing, sheathing, and replacing siding on the Oceanic Hotel tower this spring. Upgrades to the roof flashing and general weatherproofing will help preservation efforts moving forward. These crucial and needed improvements will ensure the safety of our guests and longevity of the hotel.

The Underworld Renovation

Located under the main dining hall, the Underworld is a dining and community space for Pelicans and senior staff members. This project is still in the design and engineering phase, and work is expected to begin in 2019. Renovating the Underworld will accomplish multiple goals; improving safety through egress and fire upgrades, maximizing the use of existing space, and enhancing staff dining and lounge facilities.

Fire Sprinkler System Upgrades

We take fire safety seriously on Star Island and we're constantly replacing pipes or valves that are not meeting our expectations. Sprinkler repairs will continue this year, as well as maintenance on the central island cistern to ensure proper water circulation to the fire pump.

Brookfield/Marine Lab Renovation

Thanks to a generous donation from long-time Shoaler Lois Williams, we will be renovating Brookfield and the Rutledge Marine Lab in fall 2018 and spring 2019. Final structural plans are still in progress—foundation and framing repairs, electrical upgrades, new siding, doors and windows, bathroom upgrades, deck expansion, improved layout, and update fixtures

are all part of the plan. We look forward to converting this space into an essential location for education and learning at the Isles of Shoals.

Lobby Alcove Restoration

A favorite nook of many in the hotel, repairs to the plaster and woodwork of the alcove, and repainting will take place in spring of 2018. A gas fireplace is expected to be added to this area for extra coziness! The alcove restoration will happen in concert with exterior repairs to the Oceanic tower.


Bathroom Upgrades
